Pitch: can be represented using stave notation. Timbre and Tempo are expressive elements in music that is used to achieve particular effects and moods and communicate meaning. Pulse can be organised into strong and weak beats and can help characterise a musical genre and style. Pulse can be grouped in different ways (metre). Structure: musical ideas can be improvised, fixed and organised in different ways – the process of composition.</p>
